The project was part of the community service that Broadreach provides at all of its island stops. Tucker O'Donnell, James McConnell, and Eric Pascavage are leaders of the group.

The teenagers, all between 15 and 17 years old, are from all over the United States and Canada. Operating out of St. Maarten, the three-week trip aboard sailboats includes stops at St. Barths, St. Kitts-Nevis, Statia, and Saba before returning to St. Maarten.

In addition to community service projects,

the youngsters dive, hike, and sail. The group climbed the Quill on Saturday and went diving on Sunday after completing the painting project.

The project was coordinated through the St. Eustatius National Parks Foundation (Stenapa).

The Gallery, operated by the St. Eustatius Historical Foundation as an outlet for local arts and crafts, looked much more inviting in its fresh yellow and white paint.
